HIAP OPEN STUDIOS AUTUMN 2021

While exhibitions are the most common way for the visual arts audience to get in touch with art, Open Studios as a visual arts event is a rare opportunity to get into the artist's private workspace, where the ways of working and the art making processes may be visible. Additionally, it is a great chance for artists to open up their practise for larger audiences than in the usual one-to-one studio visits. The 2021 autumn season Open Studios feature a variety of practices, media and makers from different phases of their lives and artistic careers.

As the supporting curator of the autumn 2021 residency season I have been contemplating the importance of the process for the artist. The residency is a great opportunity to orientate with one's own process, to get to know it. The studio visits with the artists have been rather peer-to-peer-type of meetings than curator-artist meetings where I have wanted to create an atmosphere in which uncertainties are allowed to appear and no obligations are set. So that the process is emphasized over the outcome.

What is the journey of nettles collected on one sunny summer day?

What is the taste and colour of your memories of one particular rainy day?

So far the process has been absorbing: It has been about taking in and soaking up. It has been about wandering around with baskets full of nettles, bark, stones, clay. Walking in company, with scissors, plastic bags full of rotten mushrooms and then freezing, boiling, drying, dyeing, separating, observing, learning, forgetting, getting excited and disappointed.

During the Open Studios, the artist Michaela Casková will let the visitors sneak peak into an experimental laboratory where foraged materials turn into inks and pigments and create, share, taste and experience the colour code of the island and other weather.

Inhabitants of Our Planet HD, Color, sound duration: 12' 7'' Language: English

Inhabitants of Our Planet is a nature documentary filmed in the environment of video games. It draws on the relation between organic and digital, combining the familiar format of nature documentary and the idealized world of videogames.

Relying on the artist's background as a documentary filmmaker, the work explores different styles and techniques of storytelling, sound design, and cinematography, employed in nature documentaries and examines the potentials of a game controller to be used as a camera.

This documentary is a departure from the artist's consideration of political mechanisms and social behavior, focusing instead on the solitary space of video gaming and the sensation of melancholy evoked by the distance between the insular gamer and nature. This sense of alienation is explored via the graphics of video games such as Far Cry 5, Hunter: Call of the Wild, Red Dead Redemption, Witcher 3, and Flight Simulator 2020.

The soundscape that fills the studio is made up of environmental sounds related to ice that I have been collecting through field recording over the past few years. These are the sounds of the melting ice that have been affected by environmental changes on the earth or traces of the ice which have already disappeared. For example, the sound of drifting ice in Shiretoko, Hokkaido, Japan, which continues to be a phenomenon caused by global warming every year, reminds us of the beautiful and fragile landscape of disappearing ice. In my watercolor drawings, I try to capture the fragility of air, water, light, and ice in a changing environment. During my stay in Finland, the light and colors of the unique Scandinavian landscape contributed to the fragility of my feeling.

THE LAST ABODE

The work is a collection of generated AI Data Artworks embraced by an immersive physical space, under the title *The last Abode*. Kaddal used machinery intelligence to train five independent neural networks to recreate visual textures that are symptomatic of different ecological phenomena.

Trained on selective and qualitative datasets of more than 84,000 images, the artificial painters re-imagine the aesthetic of the horizon, sunsets, planet earth,

volcanic eruptions, portraits and fungal colonies. The dynamic visuals change their shapes and colors, showcasing a unique and immersive representation of machinery intelligence.

1. The Horizon Dweller: Trained on a dataset of nordic horizon landscapes taken in lapland in Finland.

2. The Melted Pearl: Composed of two separate neural networks, the first has been trained on icelandic volcanic eruption. The second has been trained on a dataset by NASA of the planet Earth taken by the International Space Station.

3. Deployer of Sunset: Trained on a collection of sunsets photos in different seasons and landscapes.

4. Portraits of Fungi: The neural network module has been trained on two different datasets, the first is the original training of human faces by NVIDIA corporation. The second is a dataset of Fungi colonies.

Khaled Kaddal is an International Resident Fellow at the Academy of Fine Arts in Helsinki. The residency is part of The Academy of Fine Arts' International Openings Programme funded by the Saastamoinen Foundation in collaboration with HIAP – Helsinki International Artist Programme.

Turbida Lux is an art duo formed by Lucila Mayol and Pedro Riva. We work with text, found footage, video and media art with an interest in the poetics that appear when unveiling other interpretations of archival material. Turbida Lux took part in residencies in Finland, Russia, Argentina and Germany. Their recent work has been funded by the Office of Contemporary Art, Bergen Kommune, and Kulturrådet in Norway, and Nordic Culture Point, and has been shown in Hordaland Kunstsenter, and The Museum of the History of Photography.



The HSL ferry leaves from the Market Square (Kauppatori). Ferry timetable here


Accessibility
